Jubilee 2025: Churches of Rome Tour Series

Traditionally, pilgrims have traveled to Rome during the Jubilee year. These pilgrimages always included praying at the tombs of Sts. Peter and Paul. These were the founders of the Church in Rome. The pilgrimages also included praying at other significant churches in Rome. The pilgrims would pray at the tombs of the saints while admiring the beautiful church buildings.

As part of our parish Jubilee 2025 celebration, each month Msgr. Kruse will provide a virtual tour of the prominent churches in Rome. This virtual tour will give us an opportunity to "visit" the Roman churches, offer prayers, learn a bit of history, and enjoy their beauty. Jubilee Year 2025: Parish Pilgrimage Venerable Fulton Sheen Tomb and Museum:

As part of our parish's celebration of the Jubilee Year, we will enjoy pilgrimages to shrines close to the parish. The pilgrimages will be day trips. You are required to provide your own transportation. You are encouraged to carpool together. Generally, there are no costs for the parish pilgrimages.

Our first parish pilgrimage will be to the tomb of Venerable Fulton Sheen in Peoria on Tuesday, January 21st. His tomb is located at our Diocese's Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception: 607 NE Madison Ave, Peoria. There is ample parking around the Cathedral. The tomb's entrance is clearly marked at the front of the Cathedral.

Please arrive at 9am at the Cathedral in Peoria. We will have Mass, pray at the tomb of Fulton Sheen, and tour the Cathedral. We will then walk one block (or drive) to the Sheen Museum which is located in our diocesan pastoral center. We will tour the Museum and watch a video. A box lunch will be provided. There is a small gift shop. We will depart the museum at about 1:30pm.

Trivia Night: Our next Trivia Night will be Sat. February 1st, 6:30pm. Join your teams together or come alone and join a team. It is a fun time for all. There is a \$10 entry fee which supports the Magi Baby Chest and two prizes. Snacks and drinks provided.

The Spiritual Life: Excerpt from *The Spiritual Life* by Adolphe Tanquerey, Desclee and Co., Belgium, 1951.

We must, then, hold our body in reverence, as a holy temple, as a member of Christ. Let there be nothing about us savoring of those fads, more or less indecent, designed to excite the unwholesome curiosity of lust. Let our dress, be in harmony with our condition in life, plain and modest, ever becoming, ever decent.

Good deportment likewise furnishes everyone with ample opportunity for the practice of mortification, an excellent way of mortifying the flesh without endangering our health or attracting undue attention, and of gaining a wonderful control over the body. Examples of good deportment are: the avoidance of anything like lack of poise or of any bodily pose that smacks of primness or softness; an erect, easy and natural carriage of the body; holding the same even posture for considerable space of time; not to lounge when sitting or lean when kneeling; to avoid all brusqueness or movement or manner and ill-regulated gestures.

Modesty of the Eyes: There are looks which, are grievously sinful, that offend not only against modesty, but against chastity itself; from such we must evidently abstain. Others there are which are dangerous; for instance, to fasten our eyes on persons or things which would of themselves be apt to bring on temptations. Thus, Holy Scripture warns us: "Gaze not upon a maiden: lest her beauty be a stumbling-block to thee." Today, when indecency in dress, exhibitions of stage and of certain types of drawing-room entertainment create so many dangers, what great care must not exercise so as not to expose ourselves to sin!

The earnest Christian who wants to save his soul at all costs goes even further so as to make the danger more remote. He mortifies the sense of sight by repressing idle, curious glances and by duly controlling his eyes in all simplicity without any show of affectation. He takes the opportunity whenever offered of directing his looks towards those things that tend to raise his heart towards God and the saints, such as holy pictures, statues, churches, and cross.
