### **PASTOR NOTE**

#### St. Louis Parish Eucharistic Procession: Sunday, July 21st, 3pm.

Everyone is encouraged to come together for this wonderful parish event. The procession is our parish's participation in the National Eucharistic Congress also held on July 21st.

Everyone is invited, young or old! I hope that many families will participate, even with young children. I hope that we will gather as a parish family and offer worship to God on this historic day of the National Eucharistic Congress.

The procession will begin with Eucharistic Adoration in the church and the Divine Mercy Chaplet. Led by the processional cross, servers with torches, and incense, the Blessed Sacrament is carried out of the church under a decorative canopy. The congregation follows Jesus, the Holy Eucharist, while singing a hymn or privately praying. The procession will go to the first altar station near the church sign on Park Avenue. At this altar, the people gather close and a litany is offered. Then there is a simple blessing with the Blessed Sacrament. The procession will then move to an altar at the Life Garden, then an altar near the gym doors, then an altar near the pavilion, and then return to the church. At each altar, a litany and blessing are offered. At the church, we conclude with Solemn Benediction. Our prayer time will include five Benedictions!

The procession route is not very strenuous. For those who still might be physically challenged, there are a few options to participate: one may remain in the church and enjoy private prayer; or, chairs will be set up outside where one can sit and participate from a distance.

Participants can bring an umbrella to provide some shade. Water bottles will be provided. In the case of bad weather, we will process indoors to two altars set up in Harkrader Hall and the gym.

For centuries, Eucharistic Processions have been conducted for a variety of reasons. The procession offers a public witness to our belief in the real presence of Jesus in the Eucharist. The procession is a symbol of our journey towards heaven reminding us that we walk with Jesus throughout our life. The procession can be an act of penance for past faults and sins. The procession can be an act of intercession, seeking a specific favor, such as the health of a loved one. The procession offers adoration and praise to our Lord Jesus, present in the Eucharist. I hope that you will join the procession to bring blessings to your life.

### The Spiritual Life: Excerpt from *The Spiritual Life* by Adolphe Tanquerey, Desclee and Co., Belgium, 1951.

#### Mortal Sin in Itself:

Mortal sin is an evil, the only real evil, since all other evils are but its consequence or its punishment. In relation to God, mortal sin is a crime against the majesty of the Godhead; it is an assault upon all of God's attributes, but chiefly an attempt against Him as our first beginning, our last end, our Father, and our benefactor.

God, the first cause of our being, is our Maker, from Whom we hold all we are and all we have; He is thereby our Supreme Lord and Master to Whom we owe an absolute obedience. By mortal sin we disobey Him; we affront Him by preferring our won will to His, by preferring a creature to the Creator! Nay more – we revolt against Him, since by the fact of creation, we are subject to Him as we can be to no earthly power. This rebellion is all the more grave, since this Master is infinitely wise and infinitely good, and commands nothing that is not conducive to our own happiness as well as to His glory; whilst our will is weak, frail, liable to error. In spite of this, we prefer it to that of God! This defiance is all the more inexcusable, since we know well what we do; for from the days of our childhood, we have been taught by Christian parents and have clear and precise knowledge of God's rights over us and of the malice of sin. And why do we thus betray our Lord and Master? We do so for a vile pleasure that debases us, from a stupid pride whereby we arrogate unto ourselves glory that belongs to God alone, for paltry interests, for a transient gain, to which we sacrifice a good that is eternal.

God is also our last end. He created us, and created us for Himself along. He could not have done otherwise, for He is the supreme Good, and outside Himself we could neither realize our perfection nor find our bliss. Besides, having come forth from God, we should and we must return to Him; being the work of His hand, we are His own and we must revere, praise, serve, and glorify Him; being the object of His love we should love Him with our whole soul – and it is in the love of Him and in the worship of Him, that we find our perfection and our happiness.

### The Spiritual Life (Continued)

Hence, He has a strict right that our whole life with all its thoughts, all its longings, all its acts be directed unto Him, unto His glory.

By mortal sin, however, we turn away from God in order to take our delight in some created thing; we do Him an injury when we choose one of His creatures, or rather, our own selfish satisfaction in preference to Him, for at bottom, it is not so much the creature which we seek as the pleasure we find therein. This is flagrant injustice, since it constitutes an attempt to strip the Almighty of His supreme rights over us, of that outward glory we are bound to promote; it is a sort of idolatry, the setting up in the hearts sanctuary of an idol over against the one True God; it is scorning the fountain of living water, which alone can quench the soul's thirst, to go, as Jeremiah vigorously puts it, after the slimy waters that reek within abandoned wells: "For my people have don two evils: They have forsaken me the fountain of living water, and have digged to themselves cisterns, broken cisterns that can hold no water."



### KNIGHTS OF COLUMBUS


The Father Ferrell Council announces a \$500 Scholarship opportunity per student attending St Bede Academy this fall. However, the amount of an individual scholarship could be lower depending on the number of applicants as there is a limitation on the total amount of scholarships. The annual limitation will be determined by the Council. Scholarships are limited to practicing Catholics who are members of St Louis Parish. Scholarships will only be considered for the students first year of attendance at St Bede. There is an upper income limitation. Students from families with adjusted gross income, as shown on the most recent federal income tax return for the current year, of \$150,000 or more are not eligible. Scholarship funds will be provided directly to St Bede Academy. Scholarship application forms can be found on the table outside Harkrader Hall and must be returned before August 16, 2024.

FOOD PANTRY WEEKEND: Next weekend July 27 & 28, the Knights of Columbus will be collecting nonperishable food items and monetary donations for the Bureau County Food Pantry. All of the high need items are in great demand. Those include: breakfast cereal, canned fruit, boxed potatoes, hamburger helper, mac & cheese, pancake syrup, pork & beans and ravioli.
