## **PASTOR NOTE**

**Feast of the Presentation of Mary, November 21**: The Memorial of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the Temple recalls – according to the apocryphal gospels, the day on which Mary, while still a child, was brought to the temple in Jerusalem to be offered to God. The Church wants to emphasize not so much the historical event in itself, of which there is no trace in the Gospels, but the total gift that Mary made of herself, by listening: "Blessed are those who hear the Word of God and observe it" (Lk. 11:28). This experience prepared the young girl from Nazareth to become the "temple of the Son of God".

The celebration of this feast dates back to the 6th century in the East with the dedication of the Basilica of Saint Mary the New built by the Emperor Justinian I near the ruins of the temple in Jerusalem. There is evidence that various monasteries in Italy celebrated the feast in the 9th century. It was not until the 15th century that it was included in the Roman Missal. This is also the day on which the Church celebrates the World Day of Cloistered Life, established by Pope Pius XII in 1953.

Bonds of love, not of blood: For the Memorial of the Presentation of the Blessed Virgin Mary, the liturgy proposes the passage from Matthew that speaks about how we are "related" to Jesus. It is a relationship not formed by blood, but by imitation: "Whoever does the will of my Father in heaven is my brother, and sister, and mother". To become a member of "His family", one must do so not by blood or belonging to a particular religion. Rather, it is a free and personal choice that translates into a commitment to do the will of the Father.

Mary, the first disciple: Confirming what has just been said, Jesus Himself said this in responding thus to a woman who was praising His Mother: "'Blessed is the womb that carried you and the breasts at which you nursed.' He replied, 'Rather, blessed are those who hear the word of God and observe it.'" Mary is the woman who knows how to listen, who knows how to contemplate, who knows how to refer everything to her Son – "Do whatever He tells you" (Jn. 2:5). Mary is the One who never abandoned her Son Jesus, not even along the way of the Cross. She "stood" under the Cross. She is a disciple who never abandons the Lord Jesus, who always "stands behind" Him.

## The Spiritual Life: Excerpt from The Spiritual Life by Adolphe Tanquerey, Desclee and Co., Belgium, 1951.

Necessity of Mortification: We may consider this necessity from a twofold point of view, that of salvation and that of perfection.

Necessity of Mortification for Salvation: There is a kind of mortification which is necessary for salvation in this sense, that if we fail to practice it, we run the risk of falling into mortal sin.

Our Lord speaks of it in a very clear way concerning faults against chastity: "Whosoever shall look on a woman to lust after her has already committed adultery with her in his heart." There are looks, then, that are gravely sinful, such as are prompted by evil desire. In this case mortification of the eyes is imperative under pain of mortal sin. Our Lord says so in no uncertain language: "If your eye scandalizes you, pluck it out and cast it from you. For it is expedient for you that one of your members should perish, rather than your whole body be cast into hell." It is not question here of putting out one's eyes, but of turning them away from such sights as are a cause of sin. St. Paul gives us the reason for these serious injunctions: "For if you live according to the flesh, you shall die; but if by the Spirit you mortify the deeds of the flesh, you shall live."

As we have said, the threefold concupiscence that remains with us, spurred on by the world and the devil, often inclines us to evil and endangers our salvation, unless we take heed to mortify it. Hence, the absolute necessity of waging a constant warfare against our evil tendencies; of fleeing from the proximate occasions of sin, that is, from such things or such persons as, given our past experience, are to us a serious and probable danger of sin; of renouncing thereby a great many pleasures towards which our nature draws us. There are then certain practices of mortification which are imperative; without them we should fall into mortal sin. *Continued on next page*

Necessity of Mortification for Perfection: This necessity follows from what we have said of the nature of perfection, which consists in the love of God unto sacrifice and the immolation of self. This is so true, that, according to the Imitation of Christ, the measure of our spiritual growth depends upon the measure of violence we do to ourselves: "In proportion as thou dost violence to thyself the greater progress wilt thou make." It will suffice, then, to recall briefly a few of the motives that may aid the will in the discharge of this duty; they are drawn from the point of view of our relation to God, to Jesus Christ and from that of our personal sanctification.

Most Precious Blood of Jesus Christ, save us and the whole world. Amen




#### **THANK YOU!!**
