# PASTOR NOTE

**Votive Candles:** Our parish has enjoyed a long tradition of votive candles before the statues of Mary and Joseph. I have added votive stands from St. Mary, Tiskilwa. One is in the Eucharistic Chapel near the statue of the Infant of Prague. The other is in front of the image of the Sacred Heart near the sanctuary. I love votive candles and want to remind you of their importance in Catholic tradition.

Lighting a candle is a wonderful way to remember and pray for a loved one who is sick, who needs a special prayer or who has passed away. As the candle is lit, we offer a specific prayer or many prayers. It is good for us to pray for the needs of others and even ourselves. But, we have a lot to do in our busy lives. We cannot stay in church. We cannot stay and pray for hours upon hours. But, the burning candle can! As the candle burns for many hours, our prayers remain present and are offered. The candle represents our prayers. Its flickering light is like our prayers begging for a favor. We offer a short prayer as we light the candle, but our prayer is present and offered as long as the candle burns. The candle also represents Christ's sacrifice on the Cross and glorious resurrection. He gave up His life so that we can receive His life. The dark candle sacrifices its wax to give off its burning light. This light is a sign of the resurrection. Through the burning candle our prayers are joined to Christ's death and resurrection. Offering a votive candle shares in the sacrifice of Christ.

This sacrifice becomes very real as we make a small financial donation when we light the candle. This is more than just paying for the candle. It is a very real way that we make a sacrifice and unite it to our prayer as we light the candle which symbolizes Christ's death and resurrection. We deny ourselves and give up something (a little money). This makes our prayer a sacrificial prayer, which is so pleasing to God. This is a small way that we join our prayer to Christ's suffering in the hopes of sharing in His glory through an answered prayer.

Lighting a votive candle is a simple way to "prolong" our prayer and join our prayer to Christ's sacrifice, especially as we make a small donation. Votive candles are a small, yet powerful way, to join Christ's sacrifice to our prayerful petition. Lighting the little candles is hugely powerful. And, it's a lot of fun to light matches and candles. I hope that you will re-discover this great tradition.

**Embraced by Hope** is a ministry in our parish that assists those who have lost a child, those who are expecting a child and to those who have suffered or are suffering infertility. Embraced by Hope is ready to help you in these difficult moments. Near the entrance of the church is Roses for Remembrance and Prayer Request. You are invited to complete a Rose for Remembrance. Each year a Mass is offered for our children who have gone before us in death, to pray with those families who have suffered the cross of infertility, to pray for those desiring to conceive or adopt, and to pray for those mothers/families who are pregnant and for their child whom they await. #### The Spiritual Life: Excerpt from *The Spiritual Life* by Adolphe Tanquerey, Desclee and Co., Belgium, 1951.

Duty of Charity towards our Neighbor: Penance is also an act of charity toward the neighbor. In virtue of our incorporation into Christ we are all brethren, all members of the same body of Christ. Since our works of satisfaction can contribute to the welfare of others, will not our charity prompt us to do penance not only for ourselves, but likewise, on behalf of our brethren? Is not this the best means of obtaining their conversion or if they have turned to God, their perseverance? Is not this the best service we could possibly render them, a benefit worth infinitely more than all the temporal goods we could confer upon them? Thus, to atone for our neighbor's faults is but to carry out the will of God, who having adopted us as His children, commands us to love our neighbor as we love ourselves.

Let us say in conclusion that the spirit of penance is not a duty imposed merely upon beginners and only for a short period of time. Once we have understood what sin is, what an infinite offense it gives to God, we are obliged to do penance all through life, since a whole lifetime is but too short to make reparation for an infinite offense. Hence, we must never cease to do penance.

Why do so many souls make so little progress in perfection? The cause is "the lack of an abiding sorrow for sin." To this the example of the Saints bear witness; they never ceased explaining the faults, at times very slight, into which they had formerly lapsed.
